Chord-Scale Theory is an approach to improvising that relates chords to scales. The notes of a 13th chord can be rearranged as a 7-note scale. To determine chord-scales, identify key centers and chord functions through Roman numeral analysis.; Roman numerals can be related to mode numbers.

The chord-scale system is a method of matching, from a list of possible chords, a list of possible scales. The system has been widely used since the 1970s and is "generally accepted in the jazz world today". However, the majority of older players used the chord tone/chord arpeggio method.

The chord-scale approach is based on the idea that if a chord is diatonic to a scale, then that scale can be used as a source to derive melody on that chord. Using the chord-scale approach

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gives improvisers (especially less proficient ones) greater melodic and rhythmic mobility (i.e., they can improvise pitch sequences in eighth notes, triplets, sixteenth notes, etc.).

In choosing a specific chord scale for a type of chord, it helps to narrow down the important differences between each scale in the specific chord category. For example, with a Major 7 chord, the difference between Ionian and Lydian is a natural 4 versus a #4.

Chordal and arpeggio approaches are still superior, even if Miles and Evans thought otherwise. With the arp. method you only have to learn 4 notes and can use the same ones to solo over many various changes in Jazz, while introducing amazing tension and feel for interesting harmony. Learning chord scales is just antiquated.

The approach of matching a scale to a chord is useful but should never be the main focus of understanding changes. The opposite or inverse approach is to see how chords fit into a single scale. For example, there are 7 7th chords that are build on the major scale and these can be used to create the "circle progression",

Scales are used in developing leads, in linking melodic ideas together, and as fill-ins, linking chords and melodies together in chord/melody. The lead player should know which scale to play over a given chord or progression of chords. (This is discussed in the Master Guide to Chord/Scale Relationships on page 106.)

If you now connect the roman numeral of the progression to the modes of the chart you will end up with this scale choices. On the D you can play D Ionian (D major). On the A, which is the chord build from the fifth degree, you can play A Mixolydian. On the Bm you can play B Aeolian, and on the G you play G Lydian .
